ENGL 425/480: AMERICANS IN PARIS





PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Americans in Paris traces the rise in Modernism, in its socio-historical-scientific as well as cultural contexts, from its roots in impressionist and post-impressionist art to its flowering in the literary and artistic life of Paris in the period just before and after WWI. Students visit museums, tour many of Paris' ethnic neighborhoods, make excursions to nearby Chartres or Monet's gardens in Giverny, and experience the wonderful cafes, restaurants, bakeries, music venues, and cobblestone streets -- everything that makes Paris the most beautiful city in Europe. COURSEWORK

Students will enroll in either ENGL 480 or 425 Spring Quarter, and attend five evening lecture/discussion classes, primarily on early modern art and Paris urban design, and a French dinner at the Dr. Weihe's home. Then in June/July, students travel to Paris to intensify their studies in the museums and in the streets of Paris. The class meets for daily discussions in our "seminar room" in the Luxembourg gardens, and for walkabout tours, and throughout the course, students will maintain a guided journal of essays and daily observations.
