The Student Manual - Professional Identity In Pastoral Ministry will guide your work throughout this course .

What are the things that excite you about that role? What are your fears or apprehensions about yourself as a pastoral minister?

## **GOAL AND OBJECTIVES:**

The overall goal for this course is to enable Master level students to make use of the tools of critical reflection to examine their professional identity and theological understandings through the creation and implementation of a learning covenant.

The specific goals and competencies are:

1. To formulate a professional learning covenant (goal) after reflection and feedback from others.
2. To establish professional goal(s) for ministerial competence and develop practical and achievable learning covenant. To locate a mentor and or support group to work with you in the process.
3. To gain measurable appreciation for one's own gifts (abilities) and limitations or hindrances to further discover the professional identity boundaries of ministry.
4. To work within a structured group environment using the resources, insights and feedback of the group and the faculty for understanding personal and professional identity issues and sharpening ministerial effectiveness.
5. To work holistically, synthesizing theological knowledge, ministerial experience and professional identity.
6. To name and state clearly the learnings derived from the process and the covenant.

## **REQUIREMENTS:**

1. Faithful active class attendance.
2. Participation in class which includes peer evaluations, attentiveness to the needs of ourselves and others, identification of your own learnings, prayer, faith sharing and written and oral presentations.
3. All written work submitted, as described in the student manual, is expected to meet the STM writing guidelines. Work should be typed and double spaced.
4. Dates for submitting papers will be named at the first class session.
