Course Description

This course, a continuation, of STMM 591 Greek I, introduces students to the Hellenistic Greek language as used in the New Testament. The method of instruction focuses on *reading* New Testament texts (1, 2 and 3 John and the prologue to John's Gospel), supporting the reading experience with concentrated study of grammar and syntax, but minimal memorization of paradigms.

Course Goals and Objectives

- Students will achieve a basic familiarity with New Testament Greek, enabling them to read (with appropriate reference materials) simple New Testament texts
- Students will learn to use the tools of Greek-based New Testament scholarship (lexica, concordances, etc.).
- o Through reading, translation and discussion, students will develop a thorough understanding of Johannine literature.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Students will improve in their ability to use biblical tools and resources as a way to inform their own exegesis for the purpose of doing their ministry.

Assessment of Learning Outcome number 1 will be conducted on the basis of weekly class assignments and quizzes.

2. Students will improve in their ability to read scriptural texts critically.

Assessment of Learning Outcome number 2 will be conducted on the basis of the student's critical interaction with scriptural texts in the course of class sessions and the student's exegetical work in the Final Paper.

Course Requirements

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all class sessions. Failure to attend does not exempt students from assignment deadlines, and may result in a lower grade. If an absence is unavoidable, advance notification is essential to arrange for an alternative route to make up the course material. In the case of an emergency which causes an absence, contact the instructor as early as possible. Non-attendance will negatively affect the student's Class Participation score, discussed below.

Assignments

Learning a language, especially in the initial stages, requires frequent practice and repetition. In the service of optimal student learning, there will be three weekly assignments, due 1. in class on Mondays; 2. online on Wednesdays; and 3. online on Fridays. Online assignments will be submitted via the course ANGEL website.

These assignments will be graded on a standard scale: an on-time assignment receives 10 points. A late assignment receives 5 points. A missed assignment receives 0 points. Both on-time and late assignments containing significant errors will be repeated by the student, and when completed receive the points due.

Ouizzes

Each week we will conduct a brief quiz in class covering material learned up to that point. These quizzes are designed to provide incentive to actively review past lessons and arrive at class ready to move on. In the grading process, quizzes receive the same weight as homework assignments and will indeed be factored into that overall portion of the grade. Quizzes containing significant errors will be repeated by the student, and when completed receive the points due.

Final Paper

The Final Paper is an opportunity for the student to demonstrate the use of Greek and New Testament exegetical tools in the interpretation of a Johannine text. The Final Paper is due in class on **June 7th**. This paper is to be 4-5 pages in length, typed, double-spaced, in a 12 point Times New Roman font with standard margins, notated in Chicago Manual style (Turabian). The specifics of the Final Paper will be discussed in class.

The final paper will be graded according to the following criteria: a. on-time submission; b. adherence to style guidelines (including length, format and notation); c. conformity with the goals of the assignment as laid out in the paper assignment sheet and in class; d. use of materials, concepts and strategies covered in the class; e. overall quality of written work (strong thesis statement, clear structure of paper body, clear delivery of ideas and information, conclusion, etc.)

Class Participation

Having completed the weekly reading and writing assignment, please come to class prepared to engage in active and thoughtful discussion of the week's materials.

Each week I ask that you bring the following materials with you to class:

- 1. The <u>Bible</u> –an English New Testament (or an NT in the student's primary language). A note about translations: I prefer that you use the NRSV. Other acceptable translations for academic purposes include the NJB, NASB, and NIV. Unacceptable translations for academic study include the KJV, LB, TEV, Msg, etc. See me to discuss other translations if necessary.
- 2. The Greek New Testament (see Required Books).
- 3. Read it in Greek (see Required Books).
- 4. 1,2,3 John Comfort and Council for a Church in Crisis (see Required Books)
- 5. Occasionally, I may ask you to bring additional texts to class.

Class participation is evaluated not only on its quantity but also its quality. In addition to attendance at each class session and arrival with the proper materials, focused engagement in class discussion is required.
