Course Description

This course assists pastoral counselors in understanding their contemporary ministry within the historical context of care and the human person practiced by religious traditions. Students focus on the history of “care of the soul” within Christianity, but also consider spiritual care in other religions. Special attention is given to the pastoral counseling movement as it emerged in the 20th century.

COURSE Objectives

At the end of this course, if we have been successful, students will:

1. Have an understanding of the history of Pastoral Care and Counseling
2. Be able to trace specific movements in the history back to 1923
3. Have an increased knowledge of developments in Pastoral Care and Counseling
4. Have an increased knowledge of Spirituality, Theology, and Diversity in the history of Pastoral Counseling

5. Understand the specific issues in the history of counseling with culturally and ethnically diverse populations
7. Have added to their skills of writing, oral presentation, and the critical reading of current literature in Pastoral Counseling history.

Course Instructional Methods

This course will include a variety of instructional strategies and techniques including: the dynamic discuss of readings the first 12 minutes of class, lecture, role plays, class and small group discussions, focused activity groups, and student presentations with peer response. Other strategies will be introduced as appropriate. Feedback from the instructor will be given to students verbally all through the quarter.

Course Requirements Designed to Meet Objectives

1. Class attendance required
2. Class participation, including definite contributions during *dynamic discuss* time that reflect your readings
3. All reading assignments-- You are expected to read all reading assignments before summer class start so we can move right through the material in class this summer
4. Write a 15 page paper integrating the History of Pastoral Care & Counseling. Make use of the required and recommended books, as well as other sources. It is expected that you will write most, if not all, of this paper before class begins this summer. **Due July 26**
