Message from the Director

Academic year 2023-2024 marks five years from the development of an Office of Sponsored Projects (OSP) internal strategic plan with a mission to cultivate a culture of research and grant-seeking. Three objectives that have guided our services and programs over the past 5 years: 1) celebrate research and sponsored projects, 2) support the success of our community, and 3) serve as a leader for research and grant-seeking. These objectives have set OSP on a new path of:

- Expanded programs and initiatives have included lightning talks, our quarterly newsletter and annual report, regular learning opportunities, proposal writing groups, student researcher safety trainings, an Academic Assembly-sanctioned advisory council, and our Proposal Review by External Peers (PREP) Program, to name a few.
- **Expanded services** to improve research development and compliance and reduce the administrative burden on principal investigators and budget managers, including individual research consultations, enhanced proposal reviews, grant purchasing support, in-depth budget analysis and reviews, acceleration of grant close-outs, management of subawards and contractors, an institutional biosafety committee, and piloting of a monthly balance report.
- **Expanded staffing** with an Academic Safety Officer who has built new policies, processes, trainings, and relationships to cultivate a safe, inclusive, and responsible research and academic environment, and a Grant Management Specialist who, for the first time in OSP, is dedicated to award management support.
- Expanded sponsored project outcomes as you'll see in this report's data over the past five years. We've steadily improved submissions (11% average growth), grants awarded (15% average growth), funding amount (14% average growth), and proposal success rates (average of 59%).

This expansion has created what Jim Collins in his book "Good to Great" coined as the flywheel effect - when small wins accumulate over time, creating continued growth and improvement. Please enjoy this year's annual report celebrating the wins of FY23-24and the expansion of services, programs, and sponsored projects success over the past 5 years!



Five-Year Comparison of Funding Requested and Awarded FY 2020-2024




Five-Year Comparison of Proposals Submitted and New Funds








EXPANSIONS IN ACADEMIC SAFETY

In her second year at Seattle University, OSP's Breena Stoner, Academic Safety Officer, focused on expanding the visibility of existing safety programs and relationships with campus stakeholders. The university's new safety management solution, CampusOptics, provides a platform for information storage and sharing across schools and colleges and is available to anyone with SU credentials. Along with the website update, most Academic Safety information was moved to the Redhawk Hub, which includes new tools and standard operating procedure templates. Breena is excited to collaborate with staff and faculty over the coming year to continue growing safety programs and awareness on campus.

Expanded Committee Structures

- ▶ University Safety Committee—met twice to discuss campuswide incidents and safety programs; submit comments and questions anonymously using the contact form
- Sinegal Building Safety Committee and Lab Safety Committee meetings continued
- Institutional Biosafety Committee established to review research with recombinant or synthetic nucleic acids and biohazardous materials





OSP's Expanded Services:

With year-on-year growth in almost all categories, the OSP has focused on expanding its services in FY24. We've added programming, resources, pre-award services and, most notably, post-award support. With the addition of a new position within our office, the Grant Management Specialist has been able to assist principal investigators and budget managers to better monitor their budgets and provide transactional assistance. From our current success rate (59%), it is clear that the resources and time we have dedicated towards both the pre- and post-award supports are continuing to make Seattle University proposals more competitive and externally funded projects well executed.





Provost's Faculty Fellowships

The Office of Sponsored Projects is proud to support the Provost's Faculty Fellowship (PFF) program. This program provides financial support to full-time faculty and full-time librarians who are involved in an active program of scholarship. PFF defines scholarship to include: discovery, integration, application, and teaching. The program provides financial support for efforts to build on previous scholarly or creative endeavors (e.g., for the writing of scholarly products or grant proposals) or to move projects in a new direction (e.g., research that could provide the basis for future grant proposals). The fellowship includes a \$7,500 stipend paid during summer 2025. Awards are made based on merit as outlined in the rubric, with an intent of supporting a diverse group of faculty across disciplines, career stages, and demographics.

Collaborative proposals from teams of up to two faculty are welcome to apply. Each collaborator will receive a full stipend. Projects that include opportunities for 1-2 undergraduate research assistants will receive additional funding to support the student.

Applications for the 2025 Provost's Faculty Fellowship program are due November 1.
